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#### To "The Point" from the Editor

The POR Ruritan Club is anxious to welcome our new neighbors, see final community improvements, and looking forward to welcoming spring to our area.

Growing Community. From our club's records we realized that in April 1980 (27 years ago), the mailings to zip code 21777 was 212. Today 598 copies of this newsletter are mailed, plus 65 Tuscarora zip code—a 282% increase. Welcome!

Canal Run development continues to have more families move into our neighborhood, bringing an even greater opportunity for having new friendships and making our area rich in diversity. But, we have many new neighbors on our older streets.

Recent community improvements include: the MARC parking lot moving closer to completion with all its grand landscaping, new MARC commuter shelters now completed along trackside, new plantings by the Ruritan Garden Club along Rt 15 (watch for the black-eyed susans and daffodils this spring), a new brick sign for the POR Community Center installed by the County, the clean up from the future Commons Park area of the parking lot construction equipment and dirt mound, older homes bring renovated, new homes built, and Clay Street crosswalks and new sidewalks, and Rt 28 new Bridge at Tuscarora Creek!

Upcoming 2008 improvements: stop sign at Gibbon & Misty Hollow intersection, completed MARC parking lot, new boat ramp, Community Center heating and air-conditioning renovations, Rt 464/15 intersection safety measures installed in next month and roundabout starting this fall, more homes, activity center, & pool in Canal Run, Washington Run Rt 28 bridge replacement this summer, Ruritan's Garden Club's phase 2 Rt 15 plantings, plus their special project - Bowis Drive median plantings - thanks to resident contributions, PORR funds, and the work of local landscaper, John Harrison of Yard Art Design.

We are really looking forward to the Point of Rocks Community Commons park along Clay Street, with the County's Master Plan stage to start this Spring. A sad announcement is the closure of C.O.C.J's store next to Aroma.

Serving Ruritans since 1998, plus Girl Scout leader, editor of Whistle Stop, Founders Day parade head wrangler, and Brunswick newspaper POR reporter for 13 years—it's time to hear her story.

#### Carroll Manor Volunteer Fire Co. Needs Our Help to be able to Help Us

The Board of County Commissioners have been requested for 24 hour/7 day a week career staffing at Station 28 in Point of Rocks.

Current staffing is only Mon - Fri - 6am - 6pm creating problems for response time with apparatus.

The Board of County Commissioners will be mailing an information packet for public hearing, switching Point of Rocks "first due area" from Suburban to an Urban district, with necessary increase in real estate taxes.

Within the last 3 months we had 3 cardiac arrests and units failed, and units from Adamstown was dispatched to cover where staffing is already limited. This is where the community can help to support the efforts to providing service & care to our citizens that we protect.

Support is needed in the form of testifying at an upcoming BOCC hearing, sending letters and e-mails to supporting the change to the BOCC, and certainly attending the BOCC hearing and 'fill the room' showing support.

Currently it takes 4 minutes of failure time after dispatch to get the next due unit dispatched. Then there is the 10-12 minute travel time to get there. This can mean the difference in saving a life or a home that has caught fire. Having 24/7 staffing will mean someone will always be there, except when they are on a call.


#### Interview with Beth Marcotte.

Past Pres. of PoR Recreation Council by Della Newman

#### What brought you to Point of Rocks?

We were living in New York when my husband Bill was transferred to Washington D.C. On Memorial Day weekend we began



Our neighborhood has changed from the original group of 19 houses and there are few original owners left. There was a baby-sitting co-op and a book club. There were a lot of things when we first moved here that now don't exist. Our kids, Toni and Chris, are happy here and I think it's important for them to maintain this stability.

#### How did you become involved in the PoR Rec Council?

Before we had kids, I was already involved in the Point of Rocks Rec Council [aka PORRC]. When we bought our house, I was expecting, as were other families near us — either expecting or already with a one-year-old. I chose not to return to work. [Beth earned a Masters Degree in Mathematics and had seven years experience teaching math before coming to PoR]. I decided to become involved in local community activities. PORRC volunteers included Sharon Gaddes, Belinda Breidenback, Jean Reiter, Marcel, and myself were the core group of people — but at that time, the Rec Council was dying. We were meeting once a month but it was getting to be too much — it was a strain with so few people most of us had little children.

#### In what ways has PoR Rec Council facilitated activities?

When Belinda became the PORRC president, she decided that the Council would meet before each of the four scheduled activities (rather than each month) – the 'Easter Egg Hunt', 'Founder's Day', 'Halloween', and 'Christmas with Santa Breakfast'. Funds were raised through selling soft drinks at Founder's Day [for a time], as well as donations from the Point of Rocks Ruritan Club, and the Point of Rocks Women's Club. Val Jeffries, a member of the Women's Club acted as a liaison to the Rec. Council and was a great support to our council in so many ways. For all those who knew Val, she was like a ray of sunshine. Val and Phyllis, whom I called 'My Ladies,' would help me at Founder's Day. I would buy them corsages to show how much I appreciated their support. In time, Frederick County Recreation Council began to give a \$300.00 grant to each Recreation Council in Frederick County.

When Jay Breidenback was president of Ruritan, the 'Easter Egg Breakfast' was added to the list of PORRC activities. The Ruritan Club had been hosting the Christmas with Santa breakfast. For several years, I took on the role of Mrs. Clause]...Vince was Santa for about 4-5 years and Bob Fauber continues to bring Christmas cheer as Father Christmas. Toni, my daughter, has been our resident elf for several years, having outgrown 2 elf costumes.

In times past, the Rec Council tried to initiate a 'Mother and Daughter Tea' and a 'Father and Daughter Dance'. We tried for two to three years to have Square Dances and by the third year, very few families turned out. We have tried to get the community involved, but it's been difficult to do.

Those that choose to volunteer for seasonal activities, often participate in judging for the Halloween Costume Contest. The children play musical chairs or the limbo game -- 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> awards are given for each age group. Typically Rec. Council activities included arts and crafts at each event. Entertainers have provided quality programs for a fee – storytelling, music, magic, puppets, games, and the like.

One of the roles of Miss Point of Rocks has been to support the Rec. Council. She has been a judge for the Halloween Party and has helped with craft activities for Christmas with Santa. Belinda Breidenback and Sharon Gaddes role-played the Easter Bunny until Miss Point of Rocks donned the suit.

#### What was one of the best moments you remember?

It was fun watching the kids at the Easter Egg Hunt, running in the field, just lying in the field, not even looking for the eggs...

#### How have your priorities shifted these last few years?

It's all fun, but as my kids grow older it's harder for me to stay involved with the Rec. Council. Toni and Chris are busy with ice skating, hockey and other activities throughout the week; we drive to Frederick, Hagerstown, Fairfax, and now Arlington during the week and weekends.

#### What is required for maintaining an active Rec Council?

You need someone who can be a strong leader, one who can delegate. Most of the time people would show up for the scheduled event. To support the event requires that one makes a commitment to come and help out, to come to the meetings, stuff all the bags with candy, do all those little things.

## What thoughts can you share regarding the need for continuing the Rec. Council in the PoR community?

One year, members of the Women's Club brought their grandchildren to the Halloween Party – the next year they called me up and asked to be judges. The Rec. Council's event made it possible for these children, who don't live here, to have a great time in their grandparent's community.

Our town is a safe place to live and Point of Rocks is a nice and pleasant community. Coming from New York City I feel very safe here. It's fun to have the family activities in Point of Rocks for people to enjoy. People can go to activities in Frederick and Baker Park, but it's not your home town and you are unlikely to run into a neighbor. Just being a volunteer in Point of Rocks helps you meet new people. There is a sense of community pride and satisfaction you feel from helping out.

These events organized by the Rec. Council enhance the charm of a little town. At the last Halloween Party there were three children that I knew, all those others were brand new to me. It's special to see new residents participating in these events, building a sense of community. I hope that people will think seriously about joining the Recreation Council.

#### **Roundabout and New Bridge**

Rt 15 and Rt 28 Road Report
from Maryland State Highway Administration

In response to the Point of Rocks Ruritan Club's inquiry, the following is the current status regarding the US 15 & MD 464 round-about project and the MD 28 bridge replacement project in Point of Rocks, Maryland. The State Highway Administration (SHA) appreciates the community's interest in these projects and commitment to providing your neighbors with accurate information



The SHA will be constructing a roundabout on US 15 at MD 464. Construction funding has been secured and we are in the process of securing a contractor to perform the work. The procurement process has made it difficult to commit to a specific construction start date at this time.

However, as part of our effort to immediately enhance traffic safety in the US 15 corridor and the intersection of US 15 at MD 464, the SHA has developed additional safety projects to be completed in advance of the roundabout construction.

By the end of April, the SHA will install **two sets of rumble strips** on northbound and southbound US 15 in advance of the intersection with MD 464. All **pavement markings** between MD 28 and US 340 will be repainted and refreshed. The existing flashing yellow beacons on US 15 and the red flashing beacons on the western leg of MD 464 will be **upgraded with larger and more intense flashing lights**.

Most significantly, SHA will install large and bright advanced intersection warning signs with flashing beacons on US 15. The signs will include a warning message alerting drivers of the intersection ahead. These signs will also be made of the brightest, most reflective material available and easily attract attention day and night. Signs of this type have been successfully used on other roadways in Maryland to enhance traffic safety. Each of these projects will enhance safety immediately and throughout the construction of the roundabout.

Maryland has constructed a number of roundabouts to enhance traffic safety, including several on high speed roadways similar to US 15. The Kansas Department of Transportation also has constructed roundabouts on rural high speed roadways with posted speeds up to 65 MPH. The crash reduction experience in Maryland and Kansas has been outstanding with regard to reducing both crash frequency and crash severity. Roundabouts can reduce con-

gestion and generally enhance the overall operation of an intersection. The design of the round-about is expected to provide adequate service for the next 20 years.

Traffic signals are intended to reduce the frequency of right-angle type crashes by assigning the right-of-way to drivers. Although traffic signals reduce the frequency for these types of crashes, they have the potential to increase rear-end collisions. In addition, the injuries sustained in a crash

when a driver runs a red light at high speed can be severe. The severity of a collision at a roundabout is less because of the lower operating speed.

Traffic signals are not always appropriate as a quick fix for an intersection. At the intersection of US 15 and MD 464, installing a traffic signal would require several months of design. It would also require roadway widening in order to provide separate left-turn lanes on northbound and southbound US 15. A traffic signal without this widening would not be adequate in handling daily traffic nor improve safety.







placement project has construction funding and is expected to begin late spring, 2008. In order to complete the project, the bridge must be closed during a portion of the project. This closure will occur while local schools are on summer break and is scheduled to last approximately 65 calendar days. In order to help facilitate speedy construction and a minimum the length of the closure, the State Highway Administration will provide the contractor with a significant financial incentive for each day the contractor finishes this work early and a fine, or disincentive, for each day the contractor must work beyond the scheduled deadline.

**POR Neighborhood Watch** under the lead of Rich McDonald, has been in contact with both the County and State roads engineers in an effort to have more immediate solutions for the intersection and has been keeping their members informed. He is also requesting the County install a 4-way stop sign at Ballenger Creek Pike and Rt 464.


